Rotary-UN Day focuses on promoting global peace

Nearly 1,000 Rotarians, UN officials, Rotary youth program participants, and guests gathered at the United Nations in New York City on 3 November to hear panelists discuss ways to advance global peace.

The annual Rotary-UN Day event drew slightly fewer people than usual this year because of disruptions caused by Hurricane Sandy, which had slammed into the Northeastern United States several days earlier. But those who were able to attend celebrated the relationship between the two organizations, which dates back to 1945, when Rotary members acted as delegates, advisers, and consultants to the United Nations Charter conference.

During the opening panel, RI President Sakuji Tanaka said the relationship between the two organizations is a natural and enduring connection because both are committed to peace.

"I truly believe that the world today is a better place with Rotary and the United nations in it," Tanaka said. "Neither the United Nations nor Rotary is in a position to solve all of humanity's problems. But that is not our goal. Our goal is simply to make things better. We take what we have, and do what we can."

Tanaka, who chose the RI theme of Peace Through Service for his year in office, said there is a connection between service and peace. "It has to do with caring for other people and understanding their needs."

"When we recognize that the purpose of our lives is being helpful to others, it changes the way we feel about other people," he said. "If our goal is service, we do not want to argue or fight. We want to live together in peace, and have greater inner peace ourselves."

Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Wilfrid J. Wilkinson asked attendees to continue to advocate for a polio-free world and to keep up the momentum toward eradicating the disease. In doing so, he said Rotary and the UN will be building a world of peace.

"We can create one of the great miracles of polio eradication: days of tranquility, when those involved in an armed conflict call a cease-fire to allow children access to health care," Wilkinson said. "To save children from polio, we've convinced people to lay down their arms in Afghanistan, Southern Sudan, and Somalia. That's something no one else has been able to do. And if that's not practicing peace, I don't know what is."

Peace Centers celebrates 10 years

Carolyn E. Jones, chair of the Rotary Peace Centers Committee, saluted the 702 alumni of the Rotary Peace Centers program, established 10 years ago. Since 2002, Rotary clubs have sponsored 50 to 70 scholars a year who pursue a master's degree in peace and conflict resolution at leading universities worldwide. The Rotary Peace Center at Chulalongkorn University in Bangkok, Thailand, which opened in 2006, offers a three-month professional development program for mid-level and upper-level professionals.

According to Jones, 95 percent of the alumni are working with governments, nongovernmental organizations, UN agencies, or in academia in fields related directly to peace-building.

"Ten years ago, Rotary decided to take a direct approach to peace and world understanding by providing future leaders with the tools they need to wage peace on the global stage," said Jones, a past Foundation trustee and member of the Rotary Club of Anchorage East, Alaska, USA. "By educating future peace-builders and working to ease the conditions that breed violence and conflict, Rotary would show the world that peace truly is possible." Said RI General Secretary John Hewko: "I think what's really valuable about Rotary-UN Day is the opportunity it allows us to take a step back and gain some perspective on just how it is that Rotary's work builds peace. Rotary has historically had a strong institutional focus on peace, it's part of our mission, and we have some very successful projects and programs specifically designed, in whole or in part, to help build peace."

Other panelists during Rotary-UN Day were Peter Launsky-Tieffenthal, UN undersecretary-general for communications and public information; Ian Pett, chief of health systems and strategic planning for UNICEF; Carolyn Crowley Meub, executive director of Pure Water for the World; Rani Hong, special adviser to the United Nations Global Initiative to Fight Human Trafficking and cofounder and president of the Tronie Foundation; András Szollosi-Nagy, rector of the UNESCO-IHE Institute for Water Education; Tim Wallis, executive director of Peaceforce; Interactor Leo Lanberg Hastings; Rotaractor Rana Ghouraba; and Rich Carlson, RI representative to the Organization of American States.

Rotarians respond in the aftermath of Hurricane Sandy

Rotary districts in New York and New Jersey have mobilized to provide relief for communities affected by Hurricane Sandy, which slammed into the northeastern United States on 29 October.

More than 160 people in the United States and the Caribbean were killed by Sandy's powerful wind gusts and storm surges, which left tens of thousands without shelter and millions without electricity. Some areas remain without power more than a week later.

"The destruction is unthinkable," says Bonnie Sirower, governor of District 7490 (New Jersey). "There are towns up and down the coast that have been completely wiped away. Several Rotary districts, including mine, have suffered immense damage."

Sirower's district and five other affected districts (7230, 7250, 7260, 7500, and 7640), which include parts of New Jersey, New York, and Bermuda, are coordinating much of the Rotarian relief effort by collecting funds and

supplies for hard-hit communities. The aid will be distributed equally among the six districts to use where they feel the most need is, says Sirower.

Sirower says truckloads of clothes, blankets, cleaning supplies, and ready-to-eat meals and other nonperishable food have been arriving in the affected districts. Teams of Rotarians have worked around the clock since the storm hit to sort the items and determine where to deliver them.

Mario Moran, governor of District 7250 (New York), was shocked by the devastation in his district.

"Cars have been totally inundated, homes destroyed, furniture, and appliances scattered on muddy streets," says Moran. "It brought tears to my eyes seeing the look of so many people walking in despair after five days of sudden homelessness."

But Moran says he's also seen incredible acts of selflessness. "People in the streets with barely anything for themselves were offering me the very little food they had. Such generosity was amazing to witness."

Rotarians act quickly

"The response from Rotarians is nothing short of amazing," says Sirower. "The day before the storm hit, I was receiving calls from clubs around the world asking what they could do to help. We have three warehouses in my town full of supplies that Rotarians have sent to us."

Governor John Andrews of District 7640 says his neighborhood in Ocean City, New Jersey, looks like a war zone.

"It was heartbreaking to see blocks and blocks of homes destroyed," says Andrews, whose home suffered minor damages but lost electricity. "I was very lucky, but you have to pay back that luck, and that's what Rotarians all over this region are doing."

Andrews says he's received emails and phone calls from clubs and districts worldwide offering help.

"All of our districts are so used to giving in emergencies like this, it feels so different to be on the receiving end," says Andrews. "The support shown to us throughout the Rotary world shows we're not alone during this recovery."

Governors of the six affected districts are asking Rotarians to send donations to their Hurricane Sandy fund. To learn how to donate and to read news updates, visit their website.

Other relief efforts:

The Rotary Club of Murray, Kentucky, USA, is delivering a truckload of clothes, tools, packaged meals, and other relief items to Rotarians in Freeport, New York. Members have also collected more than \$1,000 for the affected area.

Rotarians in District 7530 (West Virginia, USA) collected 20 generators, and the Rotary Club of Tucker County, West Virginia, is distributing them in areas left without power by several feet of snow.

Rotaractors at the Rotary-UN Day distributed 350 boxed lunches to the Bowery Mission in New York City on 3 November.

ShelterBox has deployed a response team to distribute temporary shelter and emergency supplies to evacuees. The team is working with Rotary clubs to identify the hardest hit areas. Hundreds of blankets have been sent to shelters.

A beautiful story and a good lesson both as son/daughter and as parents.

This is a powerful message in our modern society.

One young academically excellent person went to apply for a managerial position in a big company.

He passed the first interview, the director did the last interview, made the last decision.

The director discovered from the CV that the youth's academic achievements were excellent all the way, from the secondary school until the postgraduate research, never had a year when he did not score.

The director asked, "Did you obtain any scholarships in school?" the youth answered "none".

The director asked, "Was it your father who paid for your school fees?"

The youth answered, "My father passed away when I was one year old, it was my mother who paid for my school fees."

The director asked, "Where did your mother work?" The youth answered, "My mother worked as clothes cleaner."

The director requested the youth to show his hands. The youth showed a pair of hands that were smooth and perfect.

The director asked, "Have you ever helped your mother wash the clothes before?"

The youth answered, "Never, my mother always wanted me to study and read more books. Furthermore, my mother can wash clothes faster than me."

The director said, "I have a request. When you go back today, go and clean your mother's hands, and then see me tomorrow morning."

The youth felt that his chance of landing the job was high. When he went back, he happily requested his mother to let him clean her hands. His mother felt strange, happy but with mixed feelings, she showed her hands to the kid.

Next morning, the youth went to the director's office.

The Director noticed the tears in the youth's eyes, asked: "Can you tell me what have you done and learned yesterday in your house?"

The Director asked, " please tell me your feelings."

The youth said,

Later on, this young person worked very hard, and received the respect of his subordinates. Every employee worked diligently and as a team. The company's performance improved tremendously. A child, who has been protected and habitually given whatever he wanted, would develop "entitlement mentality" and would always put himself first. He would be ignorant of his parent's efforts. When he starts work, he assumes that every person must listen to him, and when he becomes a manager, he would never know the sufferings of his employees and would always blame others.

For this kind of people, who may be good academically, may be successful for a while, but eventually would not feel sense of achievement.

He will grumble and be full of hatred and fight for more. If we are this kind of protective parents, are we really showing love or are we destroying the kid instead?

You can let your kid live in a big house, give him a Driver & Car for going around, Eat a Good Meal, learn Piano, Watch a Big Screen TV. But when you are Cutting Grass, please let them experience it. After a Meal, let them Wash their Plates and Bowls together with their Brothers and Sisters.

Tell them to Travel in Public Bus, It is not because you do not have Money for Car or to Hire a Maid, but it is because you want to Love them in a right way. You want them to understand, no matter how rich their parents are, one day their hair will Grow Grey, same as the Mother of that young person. The most important thing is your kid learns how to appreciate the effort and experience the difficulty and learns the ability to work with others to get things done.

"Happy is he who has lofty and noble aspirations. Happy is he who enriches the lives of others. Happy is he who allows others to live in peace.

Happy is he who makes this world a better place to live in.

Happy is he whose work, chores and daily tasks are labours of love.

Happy is he who loves love".
