MILLION DOLLAR DONATION FOR POLIO+

Sir Emeka Offor, of Nigeria, is chairman of the Chrome Group, a leading conglomerate in oil and gas services, power, logistics and telecommunications. A Rotarian, Offor is a member of the Arch C. Klumph Society, which honors those who give at least US\$250,000 to the Foundation. On Monday, Offor announced he is giving another US\$1 million to the Rotary Foundation for polio eradication. We caught up with Offor after his announcement at the PolioPlus Advocacy Workshop at

Polio Eradication gets big boost

An announcement at the Rotary International Convention in Lisbon, Portugal, set the stage for a bold new chapter in the partnership between Rotary and the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation in the campaign for polio eradication.

"Going forward, the Gates Foundation will match two-

the 2013 Rotary Convention in Lisbon.

Rotary Voices: You arose from humble roots to establish yourself as a successful businessman. How did your upbringing help shape who you are?

Sir Emeka Offor: I was born in the northeastern part of Nigeria in a little town in Cano state. My dad was a policeman. He was also a very hard disciplinarian. He made sure I did the right thing. At an early age, at 11 years, he sent me to live with my uncle, who was then a teacher. Teachers were seen as being good at molding a child's behavior, so that is why my dad sent me to live with his younger brother, and I grew to learn right from wrong. And to be self-reliant. When I finished high school, I started in the asphalt business, and that continued into construction, fabrication, and eventually to where I am today.

RV: You have given generously to a number of causes including in support of literacy, disease prevention, peace, and child and maternal health. You are the founder of the Sir Emeka Offor Foundation (SEOF). Why is giving important to you?

Offor: I knew how I started my life, and I knew how I wanted to get to where I am now. And I knew it was a lot of hard work. My dad had to make many sacrifices to see that his young ones had a chance. After what my father went through, and what my entire family went through, I decided I must support the underprivileged in society, people who are not able to afford three square meals. People who can't go to school. In our foundation, we have more than 5,000 widows we are taking care of, creating jobs for them, so they can fend for themselves. I want to help others escape the past I experienced. This is a goal that drives me each day.

RV: You have been very generous to Rotary in the past, including contributions of more than \$250,000 to The Rotary Foundation. Why are you a supporter of the Foundation?

Offor: I take pride in the good work that Rotary is doing. When I look at the programs of SEOF and I find that Rotary has a foundation that fits into what I want to achieve personally through my foundation, that's why I extended my help and support to Rotary. Rotary has a wider reach and an international reach.

RV: Why did you decide to give a new donation to PolioPlus?

Offor: When I was growing up in Nigeria, a lot of my friends' leaders died of various diseases that I did not know about. As I grew up, and became more enlightened I started knowing the causes and what diseases they

to-one, up to US\$35 million per year, every dollar Rotary commits to reduce the funding shortfall for polio eradication through 2018," said Jeff Raikes, the foundation's chief executive officer, in a prerecorded video address shown during the convention's plenary session on 25 June. "If fully realized, the value of this new partnership with Rotary is more than \$500 million. In this way, your contributions to polio will work twice as hard."

The joint effort, called End Polio Now – Make History Today, comes during a critical phase for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative . The estimated cost of the initiative's 2013-18 Polio Eradication and Endgame Strategic Plan is \$5.5 billion. Funding commitments , announced at the Global Vaccine Summit in April, total \$4 billion. Unless the \$1.5 billion funding gap is met, immunization levels in polio-affected countries will decrease. And if polio is allowed to rebound, within a decade, more than 200,000 children worldwide could be paralyzed every year.

Rotary and the Gates Foundation are determined not to let polio make a comeback.

"We will combine the strength of Rotary's network with our resources, and together with the other partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI), we will not just end a disease but change the face of public health forever," said Raikes.

In 2007, the Gates Foundation gave The Rotary Foundation a \$100 million challenge grant for polio eradication, and in 2009, increased it to \$355 million. Rotary agreed to raise \$200 million in matching funds by 30 June 2012, but Rotarians in fact raised \$228.7 million toward the challenge.

"Now is the time for us all to take action: Talk to your government leaders, share your polio story with your social networks, and encourage others to join you in supporting this historic effort," Raikes added. "When Rotarians combine the passion for service along with the power of a global network, you are unstoppable, and the Gates Foundation is proud to partner with you. Let's make history and End Polio Now."

End game strategy

Bruce Aylward, assistant director-general for Polio, Emergencies and Country Collaboration at the World Health Organization -- a GPEI partner -- said that the finish line for polio eradication is in sight, but cautioned that "it is one thing to see the finish line; it is another to cross it."

Sharing details of the latest polio eradication strategic

were. I came across polio. If you go to Nigeria, you see children, adults, who can't walk, they need support to walk. You can't cure polio. We have to invest in preventing it. I hope that my means will inspire others to join the fight to end polio in Nigeria.

RV: Nigeria is one of three countries were the polio virus is still endemic. What must be done to eradicate polio from your country?

Offor: This terrible disease still exists in my country. At times the progress is slow. We have had security challenges, and other issues have complicated public health activity. Some parents refuse immunization for their children because they fear the perceived violence that has broken out against immunization workers. Last summer, we began activities to discover resistant populations and raise awareness. Rotarians from all parts of the country treat eradication of polio as a top priority. We are working to secure funding both from our own foundation and by reaching out to others to help, and we are using the model used in India which was successful in eradicating polio in that country. Polio can be eradicated in my country in my lifetime, and it will be.

RV: How will you feel when polio is finally gone?

Offor: When polio is finally gone, that day will be my most wonderful day. Having seen what polio has done in my country, to have polio eradicated in my lifetime will make me very happy. I am very grateful to God.

Convention draws to a close with recognition of outstanding peace efforts

As was fitting for a meeting that has been all about peace, the 2013 Rotary International Convention in Lisbon drew to a close Wednesday with RI President Sakuji Tanaka recognizing a Rotary club that has spread Rotary's message of peace in "a very unique and effective way."

"This year I challenged every Rotary club to conduct activities to enhance peace in their community," Tanaka said, in introducing the presentation. "Their response has exceeded my wildest expectations, and I offer my sincere thanks to all of the Rotarians who promoted Peace Through Service every day in ways big and small."

Tanaka presented a plaque to Ralf Trautwein, president of the Rotary Club of Villingen-Schwenningen, Germany, which reached out to popular German band Marco und die Elfenbande to write and record a song to plan, he said the plan is historic in finally setting out the endgame, the final steps needed to wipe out polio.

"We now have the plan to complete the program of PolioPlus," Aylward said. "And we have backing of you, Rotarians around the world, to get the job done."

Actress Archie Panjabi, a Rotary polio eradication ambassador, recounted how, as a 10-year-old living in India, she had seen children crawling along the streets, propelled only by their hands. The image troubled her for years. When she was asked to join Rotary's This Close campaign in 2011, she said she realized that the children she'd seen were polio victims, and that by working to eliminate polio, she could help prevent others from suffering in that way.

"I came to realize that we still have work to do, and how important it is for people like me -- people like you -- to use our voices to raise awareness of, and support for, the global effort to eradicate polio," Panjabi said. "As a Rotary polio ambassador, I will continue to do whatever I can to spread the word."

Million dollar donation

John Germ, vice chair of the International PolioPlus Committee, asked Rotarians to reach out to their non-Rotarian colleagues to raise money for polio eradication. He also introduced Sir Emeka Offor, a Nigerian Rotarian, who announced that he is making a new US\$1 million contribution to PolioPlus.

During a PolioPlus Advocacy workshop a day earlier, Offor had explained that his contributions to a number of causes are motivated by his humble origins. Now, as a successful businessman, he enjoys giving in order to help others avoid the circumstances he faced. As a Rotarian, he said he takes pride in Rotary's good work and in the organization's leadership in the polio eradication campaign.

"I hope my means will inspire others to join the fight to end polio in Nigeria," Offor said. "Polio can be eradicated in my country in my lifetime, and it will be." Also during the plenary session, Rotary Foundation Trustee Chair Wilfrid Wilkinson reviewed The Rotary Foundation's accomplishments, all of which were made possible by a 1960s decision by Rotary leaders to use Foundation grants to fund Rotary service.

"Because of the one moment ... because of their ambition, I can look back with all of you at 50 incredible years of achievements through our Foundation -- lives that we have touched, lives that we have saved, lives to

teach young people about the importance of peace and how Rotary is working to achieve it.

"The Rotary Peace Song," which was played during the plenary session, has been performed before hundreds of schoolchildren in Germany and distributed by CD.

"The Rotary Peace Song' shares a simple but profound message: Each day, through Rotary, we have the power to make a more peaceful world for future generations," Tanaka said.

Attendees also got their first look at the "Lisbon Declaration of Peace." The declaration is an extension of three earlier declarations that were adopted during Rotary Global Peace Forums in Berlin, Germany; Honolulu, Hawaii, USA; and Hiroshima, Japan. Past RI President Luis Giay served on the Rotary Peace Forums Committee and helped convene the forums.

"While this was truly a great achievement, with more than 6,000 enthusiastic participants and very inspirational presentations about peace from all over the world, it was only the beginning," said Giay. "In parallel, many other peace forums were organized by clubs and districts around the world."

President-elect

Later in the closing plenary, President-elect Ron Burton and his family were introduced. Burton told attendees it is an exciting time to be a Rotarian, and he believes the coming year will be one of the greatest Rotary years ever experienced as Rotary nears the end of its campaign to eradicate polio and starts a new era for the Foundation.

Future Vision launch

On 1 July, all Rotary district will begin using the Rotary Foundation's new grant model, which has been known as Future Vision. Future Vision Committee Chair Luis Giay lead convention attendees in a countdown to the launch of the grant model Tuesday, as the plenary video screens displayed a rocket blasting off into space.






The man looked at the frog for a short time, reached over, picked it up carefully, and placed it in his front pocket.
