
visits a Club two weeks before the intended visit of the District Governor. With that he presented a Memento to AG K U Rajah.

# **DISTRICT NEWS**

### **CANCER SCREENING**

My dear Presidents of Rotary Clubs,



The National Cancer Society Malaysia (NCSM), a cancer NGO that provides holistic cancer treatment and support to cancer patients and cancer screening for

the public, is providing **FREE** Mammogram screening and Pap smear tests for underprivileged women under its Community Outreach Programme, as part of its efforts to fight cancer through education, screening and early detection of cancer

Statistics show that Breast cancer is the most common cancer in females. This disease accounted for approximately 30% of newly diagnosed cancer cases in Malaysian women. **1 in 19** ladies has the risk of lifetime to get breast cancer. Peak incidence of breast cancer is between 50 and 59 years. **Cervical cancer** is the second most common cancer among women in Malaysia. The incidence and mortality rate for cervical cancer is 6.6% and 3.1% respectively. 6 out of 10 diagnoses occur in women who never had a Pap Smear Test done or have not had one done for the past 5 years. 60% of cancer in Malaysia is presented late resulting in high mortality rates.

However, cancer could be prevented with regular screening which allows doctors to look for early warning signs of cancer and provide early treatment. It is recommended that women above the age of 40 should undergo mammogram screening annually while women over the age of 35 are encouraged to undergo pap smear tests once in 3 years.

NCSM has extended an invitation to Rotary clubs to mobilise underprivileged women over the age of 40, to attend **free mammogram screening and pap smear tests** at their Cancer Detection Centre located at *Bangunan Persatuan Kanser Malaysia*, No 66, Jalan Raja Muda Abdul Aziz, Kampung Baru, Kuala Lumpur. Please refer to the letter from NCSM attached.

This is a great opportunity for Rotary clubs, especially those in Klang Valley, to take advantage of NCSM's offer and initiate a project to mobilise underprivileged women in your locality, who are above 40 years old and whose household incomes are below RM3,500 and bring them to NCSM's Women's Cancer Detection Centre for the free mammogram and pap smear

test. Clubs would need to arrange for transport for the women to ferry them to the Centre and back, if necessary. NCSM usually do free screenings for groups on Saturdays, with prior appointment. They have also stipulated that the number of women in each group send to their Centre for the screening on Saturdays should not be less than 25 and not more than 40. Clubs are required to call NCSM to fix a date and time each time they want to send the women to the Centre for the screening.

Dear Presidents,

Since NCSM's screening centre is located in Kuala Lumpur it is more likely that the Rotary clubs in Klang Valley will take advantage of NCSM's free screening services. However, clubs outside the Klang Valley area who are keen to undertake this project and willing to ferry the women to NCSM's Centre in Kuala Lumpur for the screening, are most welcome to do so.

The District Community Service Committee is in the meantime working on a cancer awareness and screening programme to be implemented nationwide. An announcement will be made once the details are finalized.

You can have the DG, PDGs and District Membership Development Chair and Committee visit your club and speak to you. But if YOU don't make the effort and take the trouble to speak or talk to your friend, colleague or acquaintance about Rotary with the hope and intention to interest him or her in joining Rotary we will never ever move from the 1700+ figure, my friends.

To help kick start and motivate you to start talking about Rotary and bringing in new members, Rotarians will be awarded with Rotary District collar pins for bringing in One, Two and Three or more Rotarians.

To ensure that this campaign of JUST YOU getting JUST ONE member we request that all Presidents, District Chairs, AGs and DG and anyone who sends out a email or hard copy correspondence to please sign off the letter / email with the words JUST U  $\sim$  JUST 1 before or after the RI theme for the year. If possible all speeches can also end with the reminder of JUST U  $\sim$  JUST 1. We humbly seek your cooperation.

PP Karthi will be in charge of reminding all of us by *e-diom* hopefully weekly of our mission to increase membership. We also request the District Newsletter Editor to find a small space in the newsletter to put in a reminder of JUST U~ JUST 1 in every newsletter.

PP Keshminder & PP Kassim will be looking into organising a Rotary event to get friends of Rotary and Rotarians and families to meet to create awareness of Rotary with the intention of increasing membership as well. If possible one each in the north, Klang Valley and east coast.

### Polio's endgame

In Korea, we have a proverb: 괴로움이 있으면 즐거움도 있다. It means, "After hardships comes happiness," and it is an encouragement to work hard in the face of adversity.

Polio eradication is long, hard work, but when we have finished this job, we will have achieved something wonderful – and lasting.

Since PolioPlus was launched, we have immunized over two billion children and have seen a 99 percent decrease in polio cases. These past few years, we have made enormous progress.

But this last effort – the home stretch – is the hardest. It costs approximately US\$1 billion every year to maintain our fight against polio. Even once we see no new cases of polio, we are committed to supporting eradication until the world is certified polio-free – a full three years after the last case is recorded. We're getting closer, but we are not there yet.

Until that historic moment, we must continue the fight with everything we have. We have to keep up the momentum, keep up the energy, and keep up the awareness. Every Rotarian needs to understand what polio is and why we are committed to its eradication. The answer is simple: If we were to stop our fight against polio now, we would lose everything we have worked for over so many years. Very soon, we would see a resurgence of polio to the levels some of us remember from 30 years ago, when more than 1,000 children were paralyzed every day. Polio would again be epidemic – and we would have lost the opportunity of a lifetime.

This is something we cannot and will not consider. We are in it until the end – and the end is truly This Close. Polio is a global health emergency not because the end is so distant – but because it is in sight.

# Former Rotary Youth Exchange student designs a backpack bed for the homeless

uring Australia's colder months, emergency shelters often fill to capacity. Many homeless people searching for a warm bed are turned away, handed a piece of cardboard and a blanket for the night.

Tony Clark, an IT entrepreneur, 1992 Rotary Youth Exchange student, and the founder of the Melbourne-based nonprofit Swags for Homeless, offers an alternative.

In the past year, his organization has distributed more than 3,000 swags, or portable sleeping units, to charities and shelters throughout Australia, New Zealand, Germany, and the United Kingdom. The Backpack Beds, which Clark and his wife, Lisa, designed, are made of a lightweight fabric and have a built-in, 6-foot foam mattress and mosquito netting. But

most important, they offer warmth with their waterproof, windproof design. The entire assembly weighs only 6.5 pounds and rolls into a backpack.

Clark was inspired to start the nonprofit when he questioned why so many shelters didn't provide homeless people with proper outdoor bedding. He immediately began working on designs for the versatile bed. "I thought to myself, 'How would I like to be treated if I slept on the street?" Clark says. "Homeless people suffering from frostbite, hypothermia, and trench foot are common in wealthy countries. A Backpack Bed is an interim crisis measure – one that can save the lives of those without shelter."

The bed, which can be purchased with a A\$68 donation, has won four international honors, including the Australian International Design Award and the German Red Dot "Best of the Best" award – one of the most prestigious accolades in the product design world.

The innovative beds offer more than physical comfort, say those who have used them – they also provide a renewed sense of dignity. "Until people are faced with living on the streets, they have no idea of what is involved. Just getting a shower, finding a toilet, or trying to wash clothes becomes a big event," says Matt, a young homeless man in Australia. "This is the third time I have been on the streets, and previously I didn't even have a blanket. Tony Clark and his organization change the lives of people like me."

The success of Swags for Homeless throughout Australia and Europe has encouraged Clark to bring his Backpack Beds to the United States. Rotary clubs in District 9800, which includes Melbourne, funded and transported 100 beds to Baltimore and parts of New Jersey and New York to help the region's homeless and those displaced by Hurricane Sandy. District 7500 (New Jersey) worked with Australian Rotarians to coordinate the effort. Swags for Homeless also donated 60 beds for distribution in Chicago, Washington, D.C., and Los Angeles.

"We knew we had to take this idea and spread its success to other countries and help save others," Clark says. "Thanks to Rotary, this is an important moment: It will be the first time Backpack Beds will be distributed to street-sleeping homeless and disaster victims in the USA."


# 8. The "Things" That You Own


# 9. Privacy




