- Peace begins with a smile.
- Spread love everywhere you go. Let no one ever come to you without leaving happier.
- The biggest disease today is not leprosy or tuberculosis, but rather the feeling of being unwanted.
- The most terrible poverty is loneliness and the feeling of being unloved.
- There is more hunger in the world for love and appreciation in this world than for bread. We think sometimes that poverty is only being hungry, naked and homeless. The poverty of being unwanted, unloved and uncared for is the greatest poverty. We must start in our own homes to remedy this kind of poverty.
- Good works are links that form a chain of love.
- In this life we cannot do great things. We can only do small things with great love.

Mother Teresa's message of love and hope lives on. May we as Rotarians be inspired by Mother Teresa and continue her legacy of ministering to the unwanted, unloved and uncared.



ROTARY IN ACTION

The Sunday edition of the STAR (Star Fit4 Life, Sunday 25 August 2013 HEALTH AT LARGE) carried a full page article on Polio, 'Keeping polio a thing of the past', with **absolutely no reference** to the tremendous efforts of Rotary International.

Following on the THREE PILLARS SEMINAR (thank you RC PJ) on Sunday, guess we have a plenty of work to do.

Dear Padma.

I hasten to provide you a short reply with cc to the egroup as your question is actually very often asked by many Rotarians in our district and other parts of the world.

UN and WHO recognises that the idea of polio eradication was initiated by Rotary. In fact it was initiated by our late RI Past Director Dr Sabino S. Santos from Quezon City, Manila, Philippines District 3770 in 1985.

Polio eradication programme started in 1985. It was later changed to Polio Plus to include the eradication of measles, diphtheria, whooping cough, tetanus and tuberculosis as the drop of vaccine could eradicate all the 5 diseases. This is again changed back to only polio eradication to ensure success of the polio eradication by 2005. The initial sum allocated was very small (if I am not mistaken only US\$20 million). But in the course of trying to eradicate polio, we realised that it is a mammoth task. So in 1988, the Global Polio Eradication Initiative was started spearheaded by the World Health Organization (WHO), Rotary International, the US Centres for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and UNICEF. Governments and Non-Governmental Organisation were also roped in to eradicate this crippling disease.

From that, Rotary's financial contribution was comparatively smaller than them. Thus to recognise the countries and UN, Rotary was often not given the full recognition although UN, WHO, CDC and UNICEF acknowledged Rotary's pioneering and significant role. ROTARY & POLIO

Polio

Poliomyelitis (polio) is a crippling and potentially fatal disease that still threatens children in parts of Africa, Asia and the Middle East. The poliovirus invades the nervous system, and can cause total paralysis in a matter of hours. It can strike at any age, but mainly affects children under five years of age.

PolioPlus

In 1985, Rotary International created PolioPlus – a program to immunize all the world's children against polio. To date, Rotary has contributed more than US\$800 million and countless volunteer hours to the protection of more than two billion children in 122 countries. Rotary is currently working to raise an additional US\$200 million toward a US\$355 million challenge grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. These efforts are providing much needed polio vaccine, operational support, medical personnel, laboratory equipment and educational materials for health workers and parents. In addition, Rotary has played a major role in decisions by donor governments to contribute over \$4 billion to the effort.

Polio Today

Today, endemic wild poliovirus has been eliminated from all but four countries in the world (Afghanistan,India, Nigeria and Pakistan), and less than 2000 cases were reported worldwide in 2008. Though great progress has been made, challenges remain. Overall, the quality of immunization campaigns must be improved, and more funding is critically needed. In response, governments, donors and international agencies have endorsed a plan with clear milestones to tackle these and other challenges to a polio-free world.

Global Polio Eradication Initiative

With its community-based network worldwide, Rotary is the volunteer arm and top private sector contributor to a global partnership dedicated to eradicating polio. Since its launch in 1988, the Global Polio Eradication Initiative - spearheaded by the World Health Organization (WHO), Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and UNICEF - has reduced the incidence of polio by more than 99 percent. At the time, more than 125 countries were polio-endemic, and more than 350,000 children were paralysed by the disease each year.

Rotarians in Action

Besides raising funds, over one million men and women of Rotary have donated their time and personal resources to help immunize nearly two billion children during mass immunization campaigns throughout the world. Rotarians prepare and distribute different types of mass communication tools to get the message to people cut off from the mainstream by conflict, geography or poverty. Rotarians also recruit fellow volunteers, assist with transporting the vaccine, administer the vaccine to children and provide other logistical support.

Lasting Legacy

The savings of polio eradication are potentially as high as \$ 1.5 billion per year - funds that could be used to address other public health priorities. The savings in human suffering will be immeasurable.





The new Rotary International website is now functional. The "Member Access" is no longer available, it is replaced with "My Rotary." If you are already a member, you must re-login with your old email address and then your old password. Then check your email, you will find in your email from RI. While in the RI email, click onto the blue wording account.

It will take (you) onto an account set-up page. Now retype your old email address again, and your new password (it must be at least 8 characters minimum, at least one uppercase, one lowercase and a number) and set security question and security answer. Then click "Create Account."

After that, you can login the new RI website at "My Rotary." If you want to log-out, you have to click onto your name, then you will find the "log-out" on your profile page.

It took me almost TEN minutes to find where that "logout" is. I find this new RI website not to my liking... The new webpage of RI (website) was released. Take a look: http://www.rotary.org/

UNABLE TO CREATE AN ACCOUNT

If you tried to create a My Rotary account but received an "access denied" email when clicking the activate link, please <u>send us an email</u> so we can let you know when this issue has been resolved. We anticipate a solution within a day.

MEMBER ACCESS DENIED

To access the tools and applications previously available through the Member Access Portal (MAP), you'll be asked to sign in again if it has been four hours since you last signed in. If after signing in a second time, you still receive an access denied error message, try signing out (available on your My Rotary profile page) and signing back in. For 99 percent of the users, this solves the problem.

The other one percent may receive this message because either their role does not give them access or their new role as a club or district leader has not been updated in our database. If you think your website account does not have the right role, please contact us.

SITE LANGUAGE REVERTS TO ENGLISH

We are aware of this issue and are working to resolve it permanently. In the short term, you can change the language code in the URL. - Walking generates positive neurochemicals. People look forward to walking and enjoy walking.
- And research shows that fit beats fat for many people. Walking half an hour a day has health benefits that exceed the benefits of losing 20 pounds.
- When we walk every day, our bodies are healthier and stronger. A single 30 minute walk can reduce blood pressure by five points for over 20 hours.
- Walking reduces the risk of blood clots in your legs.

- Walking 30 minutes a day cuts the rate of people becoming diabetic by more than half and it cuts the risk of people over 60 becoming diabetic by almost 70 percent.
- Walking cuts the risk of stroke by more than 25 percent.
- Walking reduces hypertension. The body has over 100,000 miles of blood vessels. Those blood vessels are more supple and healthier when we walk.
- Walking cuts the risk of cancer as well as diabetes and stroke.
- Women who walk have a 20 percent lower likelihood of getting breast cancer and a 31 percent lower risk of getting colon cancer.
- Women with breast cancer who walk regularly can reduce their recurrence rate and their mortality rate by over 50 percent.
- The human body works better when we walk. The body resists diseases better when we walk, and the body heals faster when we walk.
- We don't have to walk a lot. Thirty minutes a day has a huge impact on our health.
- Men who walk thirty minutes a day have a significantly lower level of prostate cancer.
 Men who walk regularly have a 60 percent lower risk of colon cancer.
- For men with prostate cancer, studies have shown that walkers have a 46 percent lower mortality rate.
- Walking also helps prevent depression, and people who walk regularly are more likely to see improvements in their depression.
- In one study, people who walked and took medication scored twice as well in 30 days as the women who only took the medication. Another study showed that depressed people who walked regularly had a significantly higher level of not being depressed in a year compared to depressed people who did not walk. The body generates endorphins when we walk. Endorphins help us feel good.
- Walking strengthens the heart. Walking strengthens bones.
- Walking improves the circulatory system.
- Walking generates positive neurochemicals. Healthy eating is important but dieting can trigger negative neurochemicals and can be hard to do.
- People who walk regularly have much lower risk of deep vein thrombosis.
- People who walk are less likely to catch colds.

She gives him another sexy little smile, seductively reaches into the waistband of her slacks and, ever so slowly, removes a crumpled fifty dollar bill.
















ONE STEP AHEAD...

The man laughs.


