She had a sweet smile, one that even being on her feet for the whole day couldn't erase. The lady noticed the waitress was nearly eight months pregnant, but she never let the strain and aches change her attitude. The old lady wondered how someone who had so little could be so giving to a stranger. Then she remembered Bryan.

After the lady finished her meal, she paid with a hundred dollar bill. The waitress quickly went to get change for her hundred dollar bill, but the old lady had slipped right out the door. She was gone by the time the waitress came back. The waitress wondered where the lady could be. Then she noticed something written on the napkin.

There were tears in her eyes when she read what the lady wrote: "You don't owe me anything. I have been there too. Somebody once helped me out, the way I'm helping you. - President Alex Chang was fined RM 5 for his Wedding Anniversary celebration.



PP Richard Liew introduced the guest speaker Mr James Nayagam who presented a talk on the subject "Human Trafficking."

• Shelter Homes

James is the founder member of the Shelter Home in 1981. This year marks the 30th year of Shelter's commitment to providing care and protection for children in need. A humble beginning in the form of a home for displaced children soon grew into the four homes we have today for abused, neglected and abandoned children. www.shelterhome.org

• Prison Educational Development Work

James started this work in June 2005 at Kajang Prison. The mission is:

- To educate and train remand juveniles to help them regain their self-respect so that they can become ethical and productive members of society.
- To focus on helping juveniles to develop victim awareness and victim empathy, along with personal insight and growth.
- To provide legal assistance (in partnership with the legal aid bureau) to speed up the trial process of the juveniles.

• Food & Financial Aid

James implemented the food aid program as part of the community services. Its purpose is to preserve the family unit by providing the basic needs for their children such as food; finance for tuition, school fees, school bus expenses, etc. That poverty should never be the reason to remove any child from concerned and loving parents.

• Youth Centre (DropZone)

He set up a drop in center for teenagers in 2005.DropZone - a youth community centre project which aims to develop a membership youth centre, taking after the concept of a second-home, which runs youth related activities in the hope that it becomes a healthy hangout alternative that focuses on

the personal development of youth. It seeks to respond to the positive qualities of young people in recognition of their role and contribution to nation building

- Providing counselling to troubled youths. Providing wholesome activities (movies, board games).
- Developing musical talents (jam sessions with guitars, keyboard and drums).
- Providing a positive environment and human mentors/models.
- nstilling good habits (e.g. making payments for drinks and usage of equipment).
- Helping with school work.

Single Mothers' Support Network

James in 2006 set up the Single Mothers support group The purpose of setting up this single mothers' support group is to give the single mothers support and to empathize with them so that the single mothers can be helped to cope being a single parent. It also aims to create a core group of single mothers who can be the catalyst of change in the plight of single mothers.

Schools For Refugee Children

In 2007 he set up the schools for refugee and stateless children

SURIANA CHILDRENS' SOCIETY

In 2009 he set up a Childrens' Organisation to work with missing children and child abduction

SUKA SOCIETY

In 2010 he started a Childrens' Advocacy Organisation - http://sukasociety.org/

James Nayagam 28 OCT 2013

- 27 Million people are victims of Modern Day Slavery
- The International Labor Organization estimates worldwide that there are 246 million exploited children aged between 5 and 17 involved in debt bondage, forced recruitment for armed conflict, prostitution, pornography, the illegal drug trade, the illegal arms trade, and other illicit activities around the world.

FACTS

- Human trafficking is the trade of human beings. It has been perpetrated mainly for the purposes of sexual slavery or forced labor; other purposes include extraction of organs or tissues and even surrogacy and ova removal
- Victims No medical examination
- Are not aware of their case
- Lack Interpreters
- Cannot work
- Labour cases
- Employer does not pay compensation
- Withholds the passport


YOUTH EVENTS



Adopt the amendments at AGM in December 2013

At the District Secretariat meeting on 31/10/13, I have been advised that it is a Registrar of Societies (ROS) requirement that amendments to the Constitution can only be made at an AGM.

In view of this, during your Rotary Club's AGM in December 2013 kindly ensure that you amend your Rotary Club Constitution by adopting all the amendments approved at the recent Council on Legislation of RI...... if your Club has adopted the amendments at a Regular meeting, you will have to endorse that decision during your AGM.

They spend a week together in a challenging program of leadership training, discussions, inspirational addresses and social activities which are designed to enhance personal development, leadership skills and good citizenship. RYLA is generally conducted as a District activity though there are times when it is held as an Inter-district or as a multi-district event. This is yet another meaningful program of RI in the service of Youth.

RI Bylaws 13.020.8. Challenging Candidates:

Any club in the district which has been in existence for at least one year as of the beginning of that year may also propose a challenging candidate for governor-nominee provided this club has previously suggested such candidate to the nominating committee. A club in existence for less than one year as of the beginning of that year may propose a challenging candidate provided such candidate is a member of that club and the challenging candidate must have been duly suggested to the nominating committee. The name of the challenging candidate shall be submitted pursuant to a resolution by the club adopted at a regular meeting. The club must file the resolution with the governor by the date determined by the governor. Such date shall be not more than 14 days after publication of the announcement of the selection for governor-nominee by the governor.

The deadline for receipt of club resolutions naming previously suggested Rotarians as challenging candidates is: 5.00pm, 11th November 2013.

The resolutions should be signed by the Club President and the Club Secretary. These documents should be submitted by post or courier. Fax and email copies may be sent in advance but the original copy must follow.

Polio cases in Syria

As you may already be aware, on 17 October the World Health Organization (WHO) received reports of a cluster of possible polio cases in Syria, detected in the Deir Al Zour province. Initial results from the national polio laboratory in Damascus indicate that two of the cases could be positive for polio, but final results are still forthcoming from the regional reference laboratory of the Eastern Mediterranean Region of WHO. Wild poliovirus was last reported in Syria in 1999.


