### **EDITORIAL**

ears ago, there was a very wealthy man who, with his devoted young son, shared a passion for art collecting. Together, they travelled around the world, adding only the finest art treasures to their collection. Priceless works by Picasso, Van Gogh, Monet and many others adorned the walls of the family estate. The widowed elder man looked on with satisfaction as his only child became an experienced art collector.

One year, as winter approached, war engulfed the nation, and the young man left to serve his country. After only a few short weeks, his father received a telegram. His beloved son was missing in action. The art collector anxiously awaited more news, fearing he would never see his son again. Within days, his fears were confirmed. The young man had died while rushing a fellow soldier to a hospital. Distraught and lonely, the old man faced the upcoming Christmas holidays with anguish and sadness.

On Christmas morning, a knock on the door awakened the depressed old man. As he opened the door, he was greeted by a soldier with a large package in his hands. He introduced himself to the old man by saying, "I was a friend of your son. I was the one he was rescuing when he died. May I come in for a few moments? I have something to show you." As the two began to talk, the soldier told of how the man's son had told everyone of his father's love of fine art. "I am no artist," said the soldier, "but I want to give you this." As the old man unwrapped the package, the paper gave way to reveal a portrait of the man's son. Though the world would never consider it the work of a genius, the painting featured the young man's face in striking detail. Overcome with emotion, the man thanked the soldier, promising to hang the picture above the fireplace. True to his word, the painting went above the fireplace, pushing aside millions of dollars worth of art. His task completed, the old man sat in his chair and spent Christmas gazing at the gift he had been given.

During the days and weeks that followed, the man realized that, even though his son was no longer with him, the boy would live on because of those he had touched. He would soon learn that his son had rescued dozens of wounded soldiers. As the stories of his son's gallantry




IPP Aaron Ong thanked Mrs June Yeoh for a very educational and informative presentation.

### SPEAKER'S TEXT



### Sewing & Tailoring

Trainees begin by learning different types of hand stitching before being taught to handle the sewing machine. This is followed by development of skills in measurement taking and drafting.
By theend of the year, Trainees would have learnt how to sew a variety of garments starting with children's dresses, skirts, blouses, pants, baju kurung, Baju Kedah, evening dresses, saree blouses and 'salwar kameez.'
Their training includes basic mathematics to enable them to do costing so that they can seek employment or set-up their own Tailoring Centres.

### VTOC

### Courses of Study

Six one-year residential courses are offered, from January to December each year.

# Computer, Secretarial & Basic Accounting

The complete Course is sponsored and taught by Olympia College of the Raffles Education Group. Trainees are taught Office administration, Secretarial skills,

Word processing as well as Basic Accounting and Book-Keeping on software like Microsoft Word, Excel, PowerPoint and Access.

The more competent trainees are encouraged to pursue Diploma Courses which will enhance their competitiveness in the job market. Scholarships are obtained for some who want to further their studies.

### Health Care

This one year programme commenced in 2007. The basic objective is to provide training opportunities for employment in Hospitals, Nursing Homes, Clinics and Hospice, to help care for patients and the infirm.

The one year training programme is conducted at VTOC in a simulated Home Care/Hospital environment. Lectures include the study of the Human Body, Principles and Practice of Nursing, General Psychology, Nutrition and specific care of the elderly with Stroke, Diabetes, Cancer, Dementia



The training incorporates specific periods of appenticeship at various Nursing Homes.

## Kindergarten Teacher Training

Trainees will teach in private kindergarte the mornings and attend classes in Theory conducted by DIKA College at YWCA VTOC in the afternoons. Trainees will complete the 1 st year Diploma in Early Childhood Education at VTOC and continue with the 2nd year Diploma in Early Childhood Education at DIKA College, Bandar Sunway, Petaling Jaya. The Diploma in Early Childhood Education awarded by Dika College is recognized by the Malaysian Qualification Agency (MQA) and enables Trainees to work in Kindergartens In addition to the Diploma in Early Childhood Education, Trainees will also undertake the Kursus Asuhan Kanak-Kanak (KAAK) conducted by the Department of Social Welfare, Ministry of Women, Family and Community Development. On successful completion of the KAAK Course trainees will get a Certificate of Attendance from Dika College and a Certificate of Completion of the Course from the Department of Social Welfare, Ministry of Women, Family and Community Development. This KAAK Certificate will enable Trainees to work in Nurseries.

### LANGUAGE AND COMPUTER SKILLS

Enrichment classes in English are given to improve Language Skills. The few who have never been to school are taught to speak, read and write in English.

Computer skills are taught to Trainees in all the Six Courses of Study.

Some of the Trainees have even taken the opportunity to sit or re-sit their Sijil Pelajaran Malaysia (SPM) examination at the end of their VTOC training.

### Culinary & Bakery

This Course which started in 2004, aims to give Trainees a



foundation for entrance into the Hospitality industry. The range of topics covered include Personal Development, Customer Relations, Occupational Hygiene and Sanitation, Occupational Safety, Food planning, Food preparation and methods of cooking a variety of meals and cakes both Asian and Western. The Course includes modules in interpersonal skills, business etiquette, stewarding, receiving and storing of goods, including periods of apprenticeship at various Restaurants or Bakeries.

### Hairdressing & Beauty Care

The Hairdressing & Beauty Care Course commenced in 2009 and is an intensive

programme geared towards equipping each trainee with the rudimentary skills of Hairdressing and Beauty Care.



In Hairdressing, they learn to be proficient in haircutting, styling, perming, colouring, general salon cleanliness and hygiene together with salon routine and client reception.

In Beauty Care, the Course comprises basic facials including cleansing, exfoliation, treatment (masks) and also a comprehensive education on make-up.

Together with both Courses of six months duration each, trainees learn in-depth knowledge about skin and hair, methods of consultation with clients and procedure to doing an analysis before the start of any procedure or treatment.

Personal grooming and hygiene, together with language studies also form a key element in their programme which includes periods of internship in salons.

# Emerging into Society and the Working World

The young women and girls at the VTOC have access to friendly, mature counsel as well as co-curricular activities organised by staff and volunteers.

Job placements are also done wherever possible. The girls are prepared to face the employment market with practical help given on preparation of resumes and job interview skills.

This holistic approach has enabled many of the VTOC trainees to emerge as confident young women.

I have been asked these questions several times including at the EGM which approved the purchase with an overwhelming majority.

- 1. It will be purchased in the name of Rotary International District 3300 Malaysia Berhad, that is in the name of our company.
- 2. Purchase price is RM 350,000. This is the same price Which Koperasi Khalsa Malaysia Bhd is paying for their 3 units which were purchased at the same time. The Koperasi Board had bid to buy up all the 4 units and negotiated the price. On my request the Koperasi Board agreed to release it to Rotary without any mark up. None of the Koperasi members including me their President were paid any commission.
- 3. Benefits are:
- Saving of rental which we are now paying at RM 1300 per month and likely to increase
- Permanent address for the District and permanent storage of our documents, achieves, reports, induction kits, flags, gong, exhibition materials, etc
- Meeting place for Clubs, Rotaractors and Interactors at a token charge
- Possibly a Permanent staff to service the DG and the District
- 4. Anything which benefits the District helps the clubs, including saving of rental costs.
- 5. The property is being purchased for our own use. In due course it will rise in value and increase our assets. If for any reason we shift out, the property can be rented out and provide income.
- 6. It is being purchased directly from the owner at RM 350,000. We will incur a Renovations cost to fit the cost. Expect to spend RM 30,000+ for this.
- 7. It is being purchased in the name of Rotary. Whoever told you it is not, is ill informed.
- 8. Purpose has been explained above.
- 9. The office lot we are purchasing is about 1,200 sq ft.

- 10. By the way the three units purchased by Koperasi Khalsa in the same Complex have been rented out at RM 1,650 per month. The selling price of units has increased and if we had not paid the 10% deposit, the landlord would have raised the price. My Koperasi had decided to buy up more units but has not been successful as the owners are not prepared to give to us at the same price.
- 11. I hope I have answered all your questions. All dealings have been done at arms length. I have strong credibility in the Koperasi Khalsa , where I have been the President for over 20 years and have led the Koperasi from a small organisation with RM 100,000 capital to over RM 8 million. This year is going to be our best year and our nett profit is likely to reach a new record.
- 12. The Khalsa Koperasi is not the only organisation where I have initiated property purchases. I can give many examples including my scientific NGO which purchased a piece of property in Kelana Jaya for RM 440,000 twenty years ago. Today it's value is RM 5 million and we are earning rental income of RM 19,500 per month. Imagine what my Association can do for science with that sort of revenue. This is my dream for all our clubs, but many don't see the light.
- 13. I hope I have given you enough material to answer those who harbour doubts . (see also page 13.)

#### MEMBERSHIP—MY THOUGHTS

Dear fellow Rotarians,

I am just back from the Taipei Institute — being my 6th institute — I am recharged, refreshed and motivated after listening to our Rotary leaders (past, present and future.) It is not usual to have such a congregation of so many Rotary leaders all in one venue outside the International Convention.

We were fortunate to listen to Past RI Presidents, President Ron Burton, Incoming President Gary Huang and President Nominee Ravi. The highlight for me was the address by PRIP Bitchai Rattakul, who gave a very moving address and was very frank about certain issues. He received a double standing ovation!

I attended the workshop on membership and it has prompted me to share my thoughts on membership. They worldwide membership had recently dropped from 1.2 to 1.18 million but now has bounced back to 1.2 million or thereabout. At most workshops on membership at international level, I find that the speakers tend to mention a 3-year or 5-year plan starting with the DG, DGE and DGN. Year in and year out I hear this. I wonder when the 3-year plan will begin and what the plan is!

I have been following our membership trends for the last 10 years and I put on record my findings and suggestions which may not be practical or acceptable but nevertheless ... I do hope there will be a healthy discourse on this subject. I believe that clubs should be aware of where they stand in the international scene, where they stand in our Zone and more specifically where they stand in our District. Each club should have their own achievable target.

The membership 10 years ago in 2004 was 1,650, now 10 years later we are much worse off at 1,630. This raises a lot of questions about our membership plans and programs...

# COUNCIL APPROVES DUES INCREASE, UNLIMITED E-CLUBS

Rotary, increase membership, and enhance the organization's capacity to serve.

The Council on Legislation meets every three years to consider changes to the policies that govern Rotary International and its member clubs. This year's Council accepted an increase of US\$1 per year in per capita dues, removed limits on e-clubs, permitted satellite clubs, and changed the name of the fifth Avenue of Service to "Youth Service."

The dues increase means Rotary clubs will pay Rotary International annual per capita dues of \$54 in 2014-15, \$55 in 2015-16, and \$56 in 2016-17. Dues for 2013-14 had already been set to \$53.

The RI Board of Directors proposed the increase based on a five-year financial forecast that projected that Rotary's spending would exceed revenues by \$9 million in 2018 if there were no increase. The result would be a drop in the General Surplus Fund below the level required by the RI Bylaws.

With the increase, spending is projected to exceed revenue by about \$5 million in 2018, according to the forecast, which keeps the surplus fund above the mandated level. Supporters said the increase would be sufficient to keep pace with inflation without necessitating cutbacks in service. Dues are the primary source of funding for Rotary's operations.

During the week, the 2013 Council considered more than 170 enactments and resolutions proposed by Rotary clubs, districts, or the RI Board.

"It has been a pleasure for me to serve you as chair and work with you this week on the legislation before the 2013 Council on Legislation," Council Chair John Germ said. "You have come with energy and thoughtfulness, and you have represented your districts well." Council Representative William Pollard from Virginia, USA, noted that the representatives were united in a desire to make Rotary a stronger and better organization.

"Rotarians have different viewpoints on various issues and topics, and this is good for Rotary," he said. "I quickly learned that some items that might not be important to my district might be very important to a district in another country."

Among other actions during the week, representatives:

- Allowed districts to have more than two e-clubs. The 2010 Council made e-clubs, which meet electronically, a permanent part of Rotary. Proponents argued removing the limit will bring in new members and will appeal particularly to young professionals, who may be less able to meet in person weekly.
- Approved satellite clubs, whose members meet at a
  different time and location from their parent club
  but are still considered members of the parent club.
  The measure is intended to make it easier for members to develop the core for a new club.
- Increased the number of clubs that can take part in pilot projects from 200 to 1,000. The RI Board uses these pilots, which last for up to six years, to test new ideas, methods, and organizational frameworks for clubs. Pilot clubs that participate in these experiments are fully functioning Rotary clubs but are exempt from some requirements of the Standard Rotary Club Constitution.
- Approved changing the name of Rotary's Fifth Avenue of Service, currently called "New Generations Service," to "Youth Service." The 2010 Council approved this Avenue of Service for youth, which joined the already established Club Service, Vocational Service, Community Service, and International Service. The name "New Generations" was meant to reflect the need to build the next generation of Rotarians, but proponents of the name change argued Wednesday that the word "youth" is more universally understood, both inside and outside Rotary, and clarifies the fact that these programs encourage Rotarians to empower youth.
- Approved a measure allowing participation in club projects to count toward club attendance requirements. The measure amends the Standard Rotary Club Constitution to require that a member attend or make up at least 50 percent of regular club meetings or engage in club projects for at least 12 hours in each half of the year, or a combination of both.
- Approved a measure allowing Rotarians outside the United States and Canada to receive an electronic edition of their official regional Rotary magazine, (cont'd overleaf)

if one is available. Rotarians within the United States and Canada were given the option of receiving a digital version of The Rotarian by the 2010 Council.

- Approved a measure creating the office of vice governor, who would act as a substitute if the governor became
  unable to serve. The vice governor would be selected by the district's nominating committee from among the district's past governors.
- Removed the travel reimbursement policy from the RI Bylaws. This will enable the RI Board of Directors to develop a policy that is flexible, able to address emergency travel situations, and able to take advantage of cost-saving opportunities.
- Defeated two measures affecting Rotaract, Rotary-sponsored service clubs for men and women ages 18 to 30. The
  Council rejected raising the age limit to 35, arguing that the older members would have little in common with 18year-olds. They also argued Rotarians should reach out to include Rotaractors who are reaching the age limit in
  their Rotary clubs. They rejected establishing lower dues for Rotaractors who want to join Rotary, partly because
  Rotaract membership records have not been collected by RI.

Douglas Vincent, a representative from Ontario, Canada, said he was a little disappointed the Council didn't adopt more changes, but feels the process serves a valuable function.

"Rotarians are the people who drive the organization," Vincent said. "It's important that representatives from the clubs, in a grassroots fashion, direct the policies and rules that govern Rotary International."


