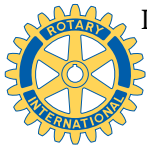

Introduction of Speaker

Rtn Yeap was introduced by Rtn Alex Chang, his proposer.

Rtn Yeap is 42 years old and single. He is a lawyer by profession and read law in the London School of Laws. He obtained his CLP (Certificate in Legal Practice) at the University Malaya and was called to the Bar in 1994. He has practiced for 15 years. Currently he is an associate at Messrs Koh & Associates and does both civil litigation and conveyancing. However he would be opening his own firm from next month. His hobbies include reading, listening to music, watching movies and football, and photography. In religion he is a Christian.

Thereafter, President Choy Ying inducted Rtn Yeap in a formal ceremony and at the end of which he was welcomed by members present.

In his acceptance speech Rtn Yeap wished everyone a belated CNY. He had heard of Rotary before and never dreamt that he would be joining a Rotary Club. He said it would be a “momentous” period for him as he would also be starting his own firm soon. He thanked members of the Club for accepting him, and Rtn Alex for introducing him. He looked forward to playing an active role.

A toast was proposed to Rtn Yeap and President Choy Ying announced that Rtn Yeap is assigned to the New Generation as well as PR. Committee.

The Speakers

The speaker this week was none other than IPP Robin Tay who was to speak on the subject of “Rotary Walk to End Polio”. He was introduced by Rtn Sarky. By profession Robin is an interior designer and has claimed to be a wine connoisseur. Recently he has obtained a Certificate of Wellness Nutritionist. His passion is to keep fit and he started his walk from KL to Alor Star as well as from KL to Singapore to help raise money to eradicate polio.

The Talk

In starting his talk, Robin disclosed that the reason for the walk of the second leg from KL to Singapore was to raise funds to eradicate polio. It also started because his partner in the walk, PP Wei Lian from RC Singapore West made the suggestion during the first walk and this was

supported by PP Leong Chin Woh of RC JB. Altogether the walk took 11 days, from 20th Dec to 30th Dec 2010.

In his talk, Robin described the various problems they encountered as well as some examples of “human kindness” they met during the trip. He also disclosed the various footwear & clothings one need to wear for such a walk, including the type of food they need to eat to keep them energized.

They started from Taman Maluri, Cheras and they were flagged off at 4 am by DGN Mansor in the absence of DG Kok Beng. Besides the 3 organisers there were 17 others, mainly from the Rotaract Club of Singapore West. The youngest was 17 years old and the oldest was 62 years. The first day ended at Semenyih with PDG Dato Jimmy Lim and his family, and some members of the RC Cheras walking half way with them. Their dinner was a steam boat affair and the restaurant owner was so impressed with them that he gave them 50% discount on the food. Robin was touched by this unexpected gesture.

The 2nd day took them to Seremban and they started at 2:30 am. It was uneventful though some younger members started to get blisters on their feet. In order to maintain the momentum they had to be careful with their diet which consisted mainly of sucrose and fructose and very little carbohydrates. They kept to a high protein diet with multi-type grain, dried longan, raisin and energy oatmeal drinks.

The 3rd day took them to Tampin and they started at 4 am. According to Robin, this was the hottest day of the journey and a couple of the younger members had to seek shelter under by passes. In fact 2 members were “forgotten” as they were under the overhead pass, but they managed to catch up eventually after taking a lift from a motorist.

The 6th day saw them in Labis and it was Christmas day. Some members of the RC Singapore West brought Christmas goodies and they had a grand celebration at a Segamat Hotel.

On day 10 they had crossed over to Singapore but at JB they were greeted by YB Dato Wee Ka Seong, the Deputy Minister of Education and he donated RM1,000 to the kitty. The finish line was at the Singapore Island Country Club.

During the walk, Robin said that the fellowship they encountered at each stop was fantastic especially from RC Tampin, RC Pontain and RC Kluang. The food was cheap and altogether they spent about RM25,000 including hotel. In JB they were greeted by 100 members and families of RC JB and at Kluang about 40 of them came to meet them. In all they raised about US\$100,000 for this worthy cause.

RI Board approves shift to a resource and support model for programs By Ryan Hyland

The World Community Service and Rotary Volunteers programs will be phased out by 30 June to reinforce the priorities and goals of the RI Strategic Plan and to shift from a program-based model to a resource and support model.

The goal of this new model, approved by the RI Board at its November meeting, is to expand the resources available to clubs for connecting and partnering with each other.

“A significant component of Rotary’s new strategic plan is the transformation of Rotary’s involvement from monitoring, regulating, and administering specific projects to functioning in a highly supportive mode of providing clubs and districts with essential resources in their international service,” says RI Director Kenneth W. Grabeau.

The World Community Service program has helped Rotarians find partners for international service projects. RI will continue to fully support Rotarians in their efforts to serve communities in other countries.

While recognizing the importance of Rotary Volunteers, the Board supported an approach to volunteerism that would provide guidance and resources to a greater number of Rotarians, clubs, and districts. Rotarians are encouraged to include volunteers on service projects, both locally and abroad.

“The primary benefits of this evolution are a greater focus on club and district service, enhanced resources in the development of sustainable and more significant projects, and the development of cooperative relationships between and among the participating parties,” Grabeau says.

In the coming months, the Rotary Friendship Exchange program will be transformed with a new, enhanced set of resources to support Rotary connections for international service projects, fellowship visits, and volunteer opportunities. These developments will be shared on the RI website and with Rotarians appointed to serve in district leadership positions for 2011-12.

“It is likely that the form and function of Friendship Exchanges will evolve as we implement the strategic plan to better provide necessary resources and essential support to clubs and districts,” Grabeau says.

RI President 2011-2012 Theme : ‘Reach Within to Embrace Humanity’

RI President-elect Kalyan Banerjee will ask Rotarians to Reach Within

to Embrace Humanity during the 2011-12 Rotary year.

Banerjee unveiled the RI theme during the opening plenary session of the 2011 International Assembly, a training event for incoming district governors.

He urged participants to harness their inner resolve and strength to achieve success in Rotary.

“In order to achieve anything in this world, a person has to use all the resources he can draw on. And the only place to start is with ourselves and within ourselves,” Banerjee said.

Once Rotarians find their inner strength, he continued, they can accomplish great things in their communities and around the world.

“Discover yourself, develop the strengths within you, and then unhesitatingly, unflinchingly, go forth and encircle the world, to embrace humanity,” he said.

Banerjee emphasized the family as a starting point in serving others. “The communities we live in are not built of individual people but of families – families living in homes together, sharing their lives and their resources and their common destinies. Good families lead to good neighborhoods, and good neighborhoods build good communities.”

Rotarians can focus on projects that support families, such as those that provide safe housing or improve maternal and child health, he said.

Continuity in Rotary’s work, including polio eradication, is also important, Banerjee said. “There are so many things we are indeed good at: working for clean, safe water; spreading literacy; working in so many ways with the New Generations, our youth, in our newest Avenue of Service and assisting them to become the leaders of tomorrow.”

Citing Mahatma Gandhi’s call to “be the change you wish to see in the world,” Banerjee said Rotarians should also focus on change.

“If we wish for peace, we start by living in peace ourselves, in our homes and in our communities,” he explained. “If we wish environmental degradation to stop, if we wish to reduce child mortality or to prevent hunger, we must be the instrument of that change – and recognize that it must start within us, with each of us.”

ROTARY IS 106 YEARS OLD ON 23rd FEBRUARY 2011.....

23rd FEBRUARYYES!IT HAS JUST PASSED US BY.

We did recognise Birthdays and Anniversaries of Rotarians!

Rotary International's Birthday just passed us by!

HERE ARE SOME PERTINENT FACTS FOR US TO REMEMBER ON THE ORIGINS OF 'OUR ROTARY':

- **THE WORLD'S FIRST SERVICE CLUB**, the Rotary Club of Chicago, was formed on 23 February 1905 by Paul P. Harris, an attorney who wished to capture in a professional club the same friendly spirit he had felt in the small towns of his youth. The Rotary name derived from the early practice of rotating meetings among members' offices.
- **THE FIRST FOUR ROTARIANS** : Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, Hiram Shorey, and Paul P. Harris.
- **ROOM 711 IN CHICAGO'S UNITY BUILDING**: In honor of the first club, Rotarians have preserved its original meeting place, by re-creating the office as it existed in 1905
- **"HE PROFITS MOST WHO SERVES BEST"** IN 1911, was approved as the Rotary motto at the second convention of the National Association of Rotary Clubs of America, in Portland, Oregon. The Portland convention also inspired the phrase "SERVICE, NOT SELF"
- **BY 1921 ON SIX CONTINENTS** : Rotary Clubs were formed.
- **ROTARY INTERNATIONAL** name was adopted in 1922,
- **By 1925**, Rotary had grown to 200 clubs with more than 20,000 members.
- **THE FOUR-WAY TEST** ...In 1932, Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor created The Four-Way Test, a code of ethics adopted by Rotary 11 years later. The test, which has been translated into more than 100 languages.

- **IN 1942**, looking ahead to the postwar era, Rotarians called for a conference to promote international educational and cultural exchanges. This event inspired the founding of UNESCO
- **In 1945**, 49 Rotary club members served in 29 delegations to the **UN CHARTER CONFERENCE**. *Rotary still actively participates in UN conferences by sending observers to major meetings and covering the United Nations in its publications.*
- **FORMER PRIME MINISTER WINSTON CHURCHILL OF GREAT BRITAIN** once declared : "Few there are who do not recognize the good work which is done by Rotary clubs throughout the free world."
- **THE 21ST CENTURY**, Rotary worked to meet society's changing needs, expanding its service efforts to address such pressing issues as environmental degradation, illiteracy, world hunger, and children at risk.
- **IN 1989 WOMEN ADMITTED** into clubs worldwide and now claims more than 145,000 female members in its ranks
- **MOTTOES**: At the 1950 RI Convention in Detroit, slightly modified versions of the two slogans were formally approved as the official mot-toes of Rotary: **HE PROFITS MOST WHO SERVES BEST AND SERVICE ABOVE SELF**.

 - THE 2004 **COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION** modified "HE PROFITS MOST WHO SERVES BEST" to "THEY PROFIT MOST WHO SERVE BEST" and 2010 **COUNCIL ON LEGISLATION** changed it to its current wording, **ONE PROFITS MOST WHO SERVES BEST**.
- **TODAY, 1.2 MILLION ROTARIANS** belong to over 32,000 Rotary clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas. Clubs are nonpolitical, nonreligious, and open to all cultures, races, and creeds. **As signified by the motto Service Above Self, Rotary's main objective is service — in the community, in the workplace, and throughout the world**

Brenda was with Pudu for a short period but her vivacious demeanor and bubbly spirit soon endeared her to many Pudu Rotarians. The Editor emailed her recently for an update of her time in Shanghai . Her reply came swiftly and her edited email is printed as hereunder for members to follow:

“Here’s a little 4 months “story” of myself in Shanghai. Time flies, and I’m have settled down well in Shanghai. I’m currently holding the position of Events Rental Director (East Region China) of Losberger Shanghai Co.Ltd.(www.losbergerchina.com), a 91 years old German company which is one of the biggest manufacturer of aluminium tents and modular structures worldwide. We do Rental & Sales of Premium Event Tents (which can host 30 to 3000 people or more), Festive Marquee and Temporary Pavilions for Exhibitions, Mega Events and Sports. We do long term rental of Industrial Tent Halls, Temporary Structures for Warehousing and Storage, Relocatable Buildings for Production and Industry.

Nevertheless, I do miss the time in Rotary, thus on the 9th November 2010 I took the opportunity to attend the Rotary Club of Shanghai’s meeting at downtown Hilton Hotel. There were about 60 – 70 people in attendance that night, the majority were expatriates. Most of the Rotarians were non-Asian. There were many visiting Rotarians from around the world. Most of the Rotarians and visiting Rotarians were very friendly and helpful.



I have to say that I enjoy this city lots, having so much fun in my work on projects like HSBC Worldwide Gold Tournament, DTM (International German Street Race), and many more. Then there are the countless nice authentic restaurants to satisfy our appetite. I miss Malaysian food most and thus I am making a list of Malaysian restaurant to discover one by one, ha ha! Till now I have tried nice Bak Kut Teh, Otak-Otak, Bubur Cha-cha, and Belacan Chicken which is owned by Singaporeans.



Winter here is beautiful, and is extremely cold as well. At one time the temperature reached minus 6 C. There was snow in December which has not happened in Shanghai before.

During my spare time, I travelled around the historical spots which have rich cultural elements. During the Chinese New Year I went horse riding in the wild and had fantastic Mongolian meals after the heavy exercise. CNY in Shanghai is quiet (with reduced population) but the sky is covered with gigantic fireworks on Chinese lunar year days 1 and 5, so never expect to have a good rest throughout the night during this period.
