February is R.I.'s designated month for Literacy and our PP Chandran has carefully researched and put together a most informative piece under this week's Rotary Information.

This month of March RI encourages clubs to be creative, to create awareness, to undertake a project or even to initiate the club's literacy project planning process.

Not so long ago Mr. Raj Ridvan Singh spoke to the club about SOLS (Science of Life Systems) and how as a non-governmental, non religious organization it has attempted to provide a unique education program free for youths who are not able to acquire a proper school education or are unable to pursue higher education due to financial difficulties or otherwise, targeting youths between the ages of 16 to 29. There is an innovative program that gives hope to youths, builds positive attitudes, and good citizenship. They have programs that teaches academic skills as well as "street smart" skills, leadership and creative skills. SOLS is so successful that their programs are offered in 6 countries (Cambodia, East Timor, Laos, Japan, Singapore and Malaysia.). The beauty of this system is its cost effectiveness for it costs just about RM10,000 to start a centre and about RM3000 per month running costs.

In Pudu let us not forget our project of setting up of a computer lab (with Matching Grant # 73289 from RI) at Kuil Sree Selva Vinayagar, Klang last November. The aim of this project was to improve the literacy standards of the community there.

Let us also recall the success of the Interact Schools Elocution Contest where the aim was to raise the confidence and standard of public speaking amongst school children. This project helped create awareness of the ability to write and speak well and generated lots of interests in the schools that participated.

RI Trustee chair's message in March states that "*Education is vital to be successful in life and Rotary can help.*" In fact RI's scholarship for graduate level students enables "talented individuals to complete needed graduate-level degree programs, *which will make a difference in the world.*"

### ***The Speaker***

---

Rtn Kumar introduced the speaker who was none other than our special guest HE Ahmed Amaziane, the Ambassador of the Kingdom of Morocco to Malaysia. He was to speak on his country “Morocco”.

His Excellency was born in 1956 and is married with 3 children. He obtained his Bachelor. of Political Science in 1980 from the U. of Legal, Economic and Social Sciences of Rabat, Morocco and obtained his Master’s degree and later in 1985 his Doctorate from the University Lyon II, France. His professional experience started in 1985 when he was the Counsellor at the Ministry in charge of Relations with the European Economic Community. From 1989 to 1997 he represented his country at the United Nations. From 1997-2001 he was made the Minister Counsellor at the permanent Mission of the Kingdom of Morocco to the UN in New York. He was made Ambassador to Malaysia and Brunei in 2005. He can speak & write fluently Arabic, French and English. His hobby is Golf.

### ***The Talk***

---

In starting his talk, HE Ahmed first described the geographical location of Morocco. Morocco is located in the extreme North-West of the continent of Africa and is bordered by the Atlantic Ocean in the West and Algeria in the East. The Mediterranean Sea lies to the North. The total area of the country is 710.85 sq km and it has a coast line of 3,500 km. It has a population of 31.3 million (in 2007). It is just 11/2 hrs by plane from Europe.

The country practices a social democratic and constitutional monarchy system of government and is based on constitutional law. The King who is the Head of State and also its spiritual leader has ruled the country since 1999. He is a direct descendant from the Alaouite Dynasty which governed Morocco since 1640. It has a bicameral Parliament and its House of Representatives

take office for a 5 years’ period. It has a judicial system independent of the executive and legislative powers. It has a multi political system with about 29 recognized parties, some of which are centrist or leftist parties. The political Agenda is to fight poverty, integration of women, transparency and modernization and the major initiatives taken is to improve social conditions.

In respect of this, it has launched many programs, one of which was the National Charter for Education and Training launched in 2009. Its short term goal include compulsory primary education up to 15 years, improve the higher education sector and improve the quality of teachers and scientific research. Other major reforms include passing the Nationality Law Reforms and engaging mega projects in terms of infrastructure and transportation. The idea was to attract foreign investment.

The Ambassador then talked about the people and culture of the Moroccan people. Most of the people are of Berber origin (about ¾ of the population are descendents of berbers). The Arabs form the 2nd largest ethnic group with the French a small minority. There are many inter marriages amongst the population. Culturally it is a mixture of several cultures. Its literature goes back to many centuries and has its foundation from the Islamic civilization. Its music is mainly Arabic with a lot of folk dancing and traditional wear.

According to the Ambassador, its cuisine is varied and has many varieties of cakes and tea.

Agriculture is important and contributes 14% to the GDP and 40-45% of the population is engaged in farming. At least 5.1 million hectares are planted with cereals with 2 million with wheat and some barley. Fruits and vegetable growing is also important.

Other important sectors are the fisheries, Industry and Mining sectors. In the industry sector, textile is a key activity and employ 42% of the people. Other activities in the industry sector are the shipbuilding, pharmaceutical, automotive, handicraft and aviation activities.

In the service sector, ICT and telecommunication are gaining prominence. Tourism sees about 8 million visitors in 2010. The main trading partners are the EU, Arabia, China, USA, Turkey, India and Brazil. He described the relations with Malaysia as good and we had established relationship since 1966.

**TRUSTEE CHAIR'S MESSAGE – MARCH 2011****Promoting education through Future Vision**

Education was the first area that The Rotary Foundation was active in, long before humanitarian programs were added at the end of the '60s and in the '70s. Education is vital to be successful in life, and Rotary can help.

Future Vision offers tremendous freedom as far as scholarships are concerned. I would argue that Future Vision improves upon the current scholarships program significantly. Future Vision allows scholars to be funded either locally or abroad at any level, for any length of time, either for a degree or certificate program, or simply for a period of study.

The current timeline for Ambassadorial Scholarships is lengthy – 18 months. Scholarships under Future Vision offer maximum flexibility and a shortened timeline. A district can keep an 18-month timeline if it works for that particular district, but it is no longer necessary.

Under global grants, clubs and districts may use their cash or District Designated Fund to receive a World Fund match for graduate-level students studying abroad under one of the six areas of focus. Districts can opt to fund the student for a single year, or provide funding for an entire degree program, up to four years in length. The global grants budget minimum is USD\$30,000, but awards can be higher than that, thereby enabling talented individuals to complete needed graduate-level degree programs, which will make a difference in the world.

So let us continue our efforts in education when Building Communities – Bridging Continents through Service Above Self.

**JANUARY 2011 BOARD MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

---

The third meeting of the 2010-11 RI Board of Directors was held on 23–28 January 2011 in San Diego, California, USA. At this meeting the Board

reviewed reports from 12 committees and recorded 62 decisions.

**Club and District Matters**

The Board reorganized the clubs in District 9100 (14 countries in West Africa) into two new districts, 9101 and 9102, effective 1 July 2013.

**RI Administration and Finances**

The Board concluded its search for a new RI general secretary and elected attorney and former U.S. government official John Hewko for a three-year term, beginning 1 July 2011. More information about the new general secretary can be found at [rotary.org](http://rotary.org).

The Board elected Antonio Hallage, Jackson San-Lien Hsieh, John Kenny, and Ian H. S. Riseley each to serve four-year terms as Rotary Foundation trustees, beginning 1 July 2011 until 30 June 2015.

In discussing the financial relationship between RI and its Foundation, the Board agreed to eliminate all Foundation costs paid to RI associated with public relations, broadcast media, and the International Assembly, beginning in 2011–12. As a result, RI will need to decrease its 2011–12 expenses by US\$2.6 million to maintain a balanced budget.

**RI Programs, Communications, and Awards**

*The Board agreed to eliminate RI Resource Groups in future years. The Rotary Public Image Resource Group will transition to Rotary public image coordinators (RPICs). Under this plan, there will be 41 RPICs serving in the same geographical areas as the Rotary coordinators and the regional Rotary Foundation coordinators. The main function of this new RI position is to coordinate a unified but regionally-based approach to RI's public image and awareness efforts.*

*The Board agreed that Rotaract club presidents must submit updated membership lists to RI each year no later than 30 September and 31 March through its online reporting tool, Member Access, and include the names, e-mail addresses, and gender of each Rotaractor in the club. Rotaract clubs that fail to submit updated contact lists to RI in a two-year period will be terminated. Rotary clubs are also now encouraged to appoint Rotarian*

**mentors to the Rotaractors in the Rotaract clubs they sponsor.**

The Board recognized the Food Plant Solutions Rotarian Action Group and the Rotarians' International Fellowship of Authors and Writers.

### **International Meetings**

Beginning at the 2012 Bangkok Convention, the Board agreed to offer a pre-convention-only registration option at the international convention, subject to review each year, which will allow participants to attend pre-convention events without registering for the convention itself.

#### **RI's LITERACY MONTH –**

#### **Implications for Individual Rotary Clubs: Why? What? How?**

***It my search for “ROTARY INFORMATION on R.I.’s LITERACY MONTH. I came across the following article. It really set me thinking!!***

- ***Do we PLAN? I often remember PDG Paul saying, “Failing to Plan , is Planning to Fail”***
- ***That others refer to us as ‘one of the premiere clubs in the District’ is getting to our heads!***
- ***Please think; Are we innovative? Or is it just ‘run on the mill’ existence?***
- ***Are we really working wit hand for our community?***
- ***IT IS, INDEED, TIME TO PLAN AHEAD WITH CHANGES/IMPROVEMENTS IN MIND.***

A. **Why** did RI establish theme months in the first place? **Why** did the RI Board Board of Directors designate March as Literacy Month?

1. ***There are only 12 months in a year*** — So when the RI Board of Directors agrees to set aside a particular month for a particular theme, the message is clear – The topic of the theme is an area to which all clubs should try to give priority.

2. ***Literacy Month used to be in July.*** But most clubs are just getting organized for the new Rotary year in July. So few clubs were able to do anything with respect to literacy in July. Therefore, three years ago (2007-08) upon the recommendation of the RILRG general coordinator at the time, Dr. Eileen Gentilcore, the RI Board of Directors moved Literacy Month from July to March.

B. **What** should highly motivated Rotary clubs do to promote and celebrate Literacy Month?

1. ***Create Awareness*** – Within the club; within the local community
2. ***Undertake a project*** (or projects) – basic literacy, functional literacy, character literacy
3. ***Qualify for the District Literacy Award*** – 5 literacy activities required
4. ***Initiate the club’s literacy project*** planning process for 2010-2011
5. ***Celebrate the club’s literacy project*** successes during 2009-2010

C. **How** might the highly motivated club do any or all of the above?

Here are some suggestions:

Creative club members will surely have additional ideas and some of those may be better than the ideas which follow:

1. Create awareness
  - a. Schedule a speaker on a literacy topic for a regular meeting of the club (or at a special meeting)
  - b. Present a literacy award or recognition at a regular meeting of the club ( or at a special meeting). Recognize teachers, or students, or civic leaders who have promoted the cause of literacy in the community. Or recognize your club’s own literacy project leaders.
  - c. Sponsor a newspaper advertisement, a radio or television advertisement or a billboard with a message about Rotary’s work with literacy

2. Undertake a project .
